Application status	We recommend that applicants check their application status by signing into their online Application for Admission following the steps at <a href="http://www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-status">www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-status</a> approximately three weeks after they have applied online and supporting documents have been received.

Course information	
Course enrolment	Once admitted into the COPEX programme, students need to accept their offer online. Afterwards students can initiate course enrolment at <a href="http://www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-enrol">www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-enrol</a> . Students need to apply for 'concession' for courses with prerequisites. In this process faculties assess whether students' prior study meets relevant course prerequisites and notify students accordingly. Detailed instructions on course enrolments are also provided in the offer of admission letter.
Full-time study course	The standard course load for full-time study is 50-60 points per semester or
load	100-120 points per year. Most courses are weighted 15 points and students generally take four courses per semester. Information on specific credit-points is available in our course catalogue <u>www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-</u> <u>courseadvice.</u>
Hours of study	A standard semester course of 15 points represents 150 hours of study or 10 hours of study per week for 15 weeks (12 teaching weeks and three weeks of study break and examinations). The student workload in the teaching weeks would total 120 hours, made up of lectures, tutorials, seminars, laboratory classes, and other face-to-face contact, plus independent study as appropriate for each course.
Course availability	Course descriptions and schedules are published in early November for the subsequent year (semester One and Two).
	Brief course descriptions as well as information on course prerequisites and restrictions are available in our course catalogue <u>www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-</u> <u>courseadvice</u> .
	For more detailed course descriptions, please refer to relevant faculty websites.
Course selection	Exchange students can select courses across different disciplines provided they meet course prerequisites and that they are not restricted (see "course restrictions"). Information about our course structure can be found on Student Services Online <u>www.auckland.ac.nz/sso-enrol</u> .
	Courses in Law are only available for students who have been nominated under a specific Law exchange agreement.
	Law exchange students can only take courses in the Faculty of Law.
Subject specific course selection	Undergraduate students in <b>Law</b> from non-commonwealth countries need to enrol into "LAWGENRL443 – Introduction to Common Law" (10 points), a course usually offered in the week prior to the official start of semester.



	<b>Nursing</b> students take course NURS302 (60 points) which generally commences before the official start of semester.

Courses with very limited enrolment availability	<ul> <li>Psychology and Biological Science</li> <li>Courses showing the letter "G" - eg, PHYSICS107G"</li> <li>700 level Finance and Accounting courses</li> <li>We recommend that students have a second choice option for each course with limited enrolment availability. Students from these areas must apply early, in particular for Semester 2. Also, they must upload updated transcripts including all courses they have taken and provide the course outlines when applying for concessions.</li> </ul>
Postgraduate courses	Students who hold the equivalent of a New Zealand degree may be able to take postgraduate courses if course prerequisites are met and accepted by the faculty. The exchange programme is restricted to course work only and does not include thesis writing and supervision. Students who wish to take a full-year course load at postgraduate level are advised to apply as an international student to the University of Auckland for the one-year programme.
Courses with additional application requirements	Courses in <b>Fine Arts, Architecture and Music</b> require submission of supplementary information such as a portfolio or DVD audition. Students can refer to <u>www.creative.auckland.ac.nz/ug-supp-app</u> for more information or contact our colleagues at the National Institute of Creative Arts and Industries (NICAI) at <u>info-creative@auckland.ac.nz</u> . For <b>language courses</b> students must complete a Language Ability Declaration to ensure that they are placed at an appropriate level. Visa information	
Student visa requirements	Students must apply to New Zealand Immigration <u>www.immigration.govt.nz</u> and obtain their <b>student visa prior to entering New Zealand</b> . Please contact the nearest New Zealand embassy or consulate for details of visa and application requirements.
	Exchange students should not enter New Zealand on a visitor visa.

Work restrictions on a student visa	Exchange students who are studying here for one semester only, are <b>not</b> <b>allowed to work</b> on a student visa and are not eligible to apply for a variation of conditions to a student visa.
	Under current regulations of the New Zealand Immigration Service, only exchange students who are undertaking a full-time tertiary course of study of at least one academic year and who are part of an approved tertiary student exchange scheme are able to work on a student visa.
	Eligible students can apply for a Variation of Conditions as part of their applications for a student visa ( <i>Student Visa Application (INZ 1012</i> ). A Variation of Condition allows eligible students to work a maximum of 20 hours in any given week, including holidays.
	Full details of visa requirements, advice on rights to employment in New Zealand while studying, as well as reporting requirements are available on the New Zealand Immigration Service website <u>www.immigration.govt.nz</u> .
	Work restrictions are stated on the Student Visa application guide.

Mandatory health and	All international students are required to have appropriate health and travel
travel insurance	insurance while studying in New Zealand.
	The University of Auckland has selected the Studentsafe-University policy as the preferred insurance policy for international students and will apply the Studentsafe-University charge to a student's account by default upon enrolment. This charge is removed either after the student has paid the Studentsafe-University premium or after a waiver for an alternative insurance policy has been granted.
	Detailed information about insurance is provided in the offer of admission letter as well as on our health and insurance website at <a href="http://www.auckland.ac.nz/is-insurance">www.auckland.ac.nz/is-insurance</a> .
	The Studentsafe-University insurance policy is valid for 6 months from semester start date (one semester enrolment) or 12 months (two consecutive semester enrolment). Cover starts up to 16 days prior to the course start date and ends on your arrival back in your country of origin, following completion of your course of study; or on the expiry of your current student visa, whichever is the earlier.
	All international students have to pay our compulsory insurance fees to the University of Auckland or alternatively apply for an insurance waiver before the start of semester if they have already bought a policy which complies with our insurance policy requirements.
	Due to the Reciprocal Health Care Agreement between New Zealand and Australia it is not mandatory for students with Australian citizenship or residency to be covered by the Studentsafe-University insurance policy. However, we strongly advise these students to have appropriate health and travel insurance while studying in New Zealand as fees for medical treatments are charged.
